Explanation of Reading Strategy

RAFT

Using this RAFT technique (Holston, V. & Santa, 2004) empowers students with an easy, meaningful way to incorporate writing into content-area instruction. RAFT is especially engaging because students write to an audience other than their teacher, and they write for a specific purpose. Since writing is specific and focused, students better understand the need to explain the topic clearly and completely. This can be used with any topic from current events to math. RAFT consists of four major components, namely:

Role of the Writer Who are you? student, plant, soldier

Audience To whom is this written? president, public, self

Format What form will it take? letter, article, diary

Topic + Strong Verb What topic of importance have I chosen? describe effects of..., explain why..., warn about

Before Reading

Introduce the material to be read by previewing all topics, pictures, and questions. Brainstorm with students the many varied and possible "points of view" that could be used to relate opinions or feelings about the topic they are about to read. To whom could these be expressed? Record these on the board.

During Reading Students then read the selection, keeping in mind the viewpoints that others (or objects) could possibly contribute on the subject. A variation is to assign students a point of view and have them use post-its as they read to mark the information that supports their assigned point of view.

After Reading Upon completion of the reading, explain that all writiers need to consider four components of every composition: the role of the writer, the audience, the format and the topic. Then, brainstorm additional ideas about the topics that came to mind during the reading. Write RAFT on the board and list possible roles, audiences, formats and strong verbs that are appropriate for each topic.

Have students choose one example from each category to incorporate into their writing about the topic.
